I hope that you are finding remote learning useful and are slotting into a new routine. I still feel like I have lots to learn but we'll learn together! I thought it might be helpful to provide some useful information and website links.

You will find probably have already found lots of information on the website to support you with Teams and remote learning- check it out if you haven't yet!

### Teams

All lessons and tasks can be found in Teams. This is where our remote learning is set and monitored.

### Timetable

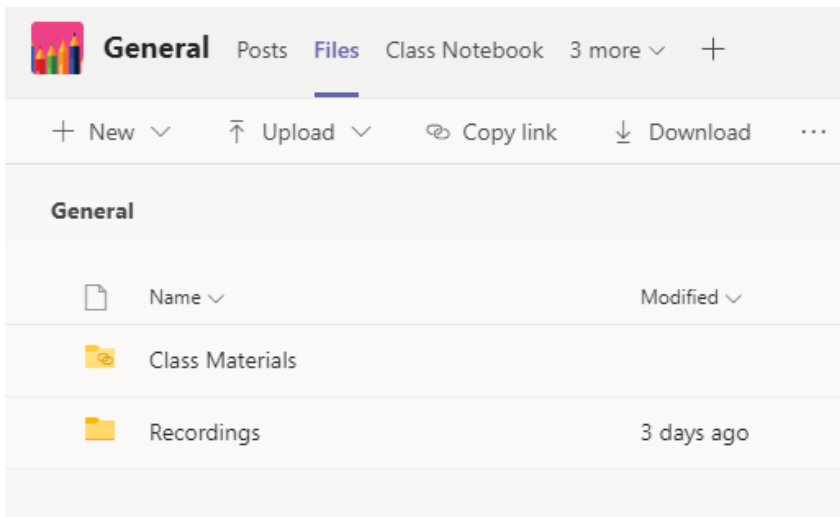
A weekly timetable is available to view on this website. This might help you to structure your days. Lessons will be uploaded in the order that they appear on the timetable. For example, History is on a Monday afternoon, so that will be the first foundation subject in assignments on a Monday.

### Live Lessons

Live lessons are delivered each morning for Literacy (9:15 - 10:) and Maths (11:15 - 12:00) These are scheduled on Teams and can be accessed at the scheduled time or later in the day, as I will record each lesson.

### Recordings

The recordings of the live lessons can be found on the general page in Teams. If you look under files there is a folder called 'recordings'.



## Assignments

Phonics and foundation subjects are set in assignments in Teams. The assignments have the date and subject in the title, so you know which one to upload your work into. The work that is completed in the lesson should be uploaded into the relevant assignment.

## Phonics lessons

We are still following the RWI programme. Daily speed sound and spelling lessons will be set in assignments. There will be an activity to complete each day which is linked to the daily sound.

## Reading

Unfortunately, we will not be changing any reading books at home nor at school.

in the series. Book number one in the series will be the easiest and the last book will be the most difficult. Follow the reading books

Please try to read once a day with your child and remember to keep practising the red words. There are red word videos on the Ruth Miskin YouTube page if you would prefer to use these.
