I hope that all parents/carers are aware of the importance we place on reading. We pride ourselves on our phonics teaching in our younger year groups and guided reading sessions with our older children, as well as the rich and varied texts we read together with classes. We encourage children further through reading raffles and reading assemblies. However, this is only part of the process to build up a child's fluency, comprehension and love of books.

'The reading framework- teaching the foundations of literacy' released by the DfE this month evidences research, some of which I have shared before, the statistics quoted are staggering.

Figures such as 'How many words children would have heard by the time they were 5 years old -

Never read to: <u>4662 words</u> ,	Read to 1-2 times per week: <u>6350 words</u> ,
Read to 3-5 times per week: <u>169520 words</u>	Read to daily: <u>296660 words</u> .'
